Anyone that knows me knows that I am committed to expository preaching. In fact, I believe that expository preaching is the only biblical teaching that exists. In the above passage, Paul instructs Timothy to "Preach the Word." It is the Word which transforms. It is the Word which exposes sin. It is the Word that reveals the gospel. It is the Word that promotes Godly living. We are not to preach our opinion, our ideas, our systematic theology, our political platforms or even our church confessions or creeds. We are to simply preach the Word. Expositional preaching is the best if not the only way to do this. In fact, not only is our preaching to be expositional but it is also to be 'text driven.' That is the text of scripture is to be the formulating factor in anything we seek to say or preach. We say what the text says, and we do what the text tells us to do. This is the heart of expositional preaching.

In the past few articles, we have been looking at discipleship. We have gathered that discipleship is not only necessary, but it is indeed mandated in scripture. We are to unite together for our own souls' sake and our common good. But what does discipleship look like? What is the best means for it to take place? I believe discipleship can look very different in various scenarios and circumstances. Men preaching to a room of thousands or one man or woman with one person underneath a tree in the Amazon jungle can both be a valid form of discipleship. Small groups meeting at church, or in homes, or even traditional Sunday school are all valid ways of making disciples.

Indeed, family devotional times, the youth group at church, Wednesday night bible studies and online bible studies are all acceptable forms of disciple-making. However, there must be one common denominator in all of these. They must be expositional. They should be driven by the text of scripture. That is not to say that we cannot study 'topical' issues in our approach to discipleship. How to pray, how to study, family, history, doctrinal studies...all of these are certainly good and helpful ways of approaching discipleship studies, yet they must all have one obvious commonality. They must in their content 'teach scripture' They must 'expose' the truth of a given text. They must answer the question "What does the Bible say?" I believe the best way to do this is to simply 'disciple' believers through books of the Bible. Also, time spent in systematic and biblical theology is helpful as long as such studies engage the biblical text. Studies that direct us to a book or an article or a video series are fine as long as the focus of the study is not the book itself, the video or the lesson, but the text of scripture.

Let us commit ourselves to biblical, expositional discipleship which causes us to engage the text of sacred scripture with the end result being that we know more of the Word of God so that we might know more of the God of the Word! We should read books...good books...we should listen to sermons and bible studies, we should attend conferences and events that encourage us to grow in our faith and motivate unto good works, however, never should these things replace the faithful teaching and preaching of the Bible. We should present it line by line, verse by verse, precept upon precept...to the end that we all our moving towards being fully developed, faithful and devoted followers of Jesus Christ!

Reverent Wonder

There is a television commercial that plays occasionally advertising a delicious candy. It has a little girl looking in the window of a candy shop filled with enticing delicacies. The look on the little girl's face is one of awe and anticipation as she considers her choice. You may have seen that same look on the face of a child as they see a Christmas tree with its pretty lights, colorful decorations and presents beneath. The look says something wonderful is happening. We can all recall moments in our life when we were filled with happiness, excitement and wonder.

The word wonder is described in the dictionary as "a feeling of surprise mingled with admiration, caused by something beautiful, unexpected, unfamiliar or inexplicable." Just reading the definition makes me happy. What if we add the word reverent to wonder. Reverent wonder. It is a beautiful term isn't it? We find this particular description in The Message translation of 2 Peter 1: 5-7.

"So don't lose a minute in building on what you've been given, complementing your basic faith with good character, spiritual understanding, alert discipline, passionate patience, reverent wonder..."

I watched the Dove Awards this year as they were presented with the theme, "Reverent Wonder." I contemplated the term as I listened to artist after artist describe what it meant to them. I sincerely believe after thinking about the term, it describes the Holiness of God and how in awe I am of a God who created all things, but yet, cares for me. Insignificant me! One who is so unworthy. One who is so wretched and depraved. All the while knowing that there is a God, King Jesus, who loves me inspite of me! That to me is "REVERENT WONDER!"

When we consider this viewpoint, it's easy to understand how worship should be a personal experience and an encounter with our Holy God!
